The Minor Prophets

Jonah – From Rebellion to Repentance

Please pray and ask the Lord for understanding of His Word before you begin.

Read Jonah Chapters 1 & 2

Nineveh was a great city on the banks of the Tigris River about 500 miles NE of Israel. (Genesis 10:8-11) It was great in power as well as size and was the capital of Assyria. The population was about 600,000; think Denver! The people of Nineveh worshipped a fish goddess called Nanshe and Dagon a fish god who was half man half fish. Can you imagine? The god Dagon had a bit of a run-in with the Ark of God. You can read about it in 1 Samuel 5:1-5.

We know Jonah was a real person and that he was a prophet in the northern kingdom. (2 Kings 14:25) He was a contemporary of Amos and Hosea. We know from our study in Hosea and Amos that Israel was in a period of great prosperity in material wealth and power but great emptiness spiritually and God was warning the nation of judgment coming.

Chapter 1 – Running away from God

- 1. Read verses 1-3. Now look at Jeremiah 20:7-9. What do you learn from these passages, specifically, the reactions of each prophet to God's command?
- a. Have you ever wanted to run away from, or ignore, something you knew God wanted you to do? For instance, forgive someone, love a difficult person or speak the gospel?
- 2. The Assyrians were very cruel people; but there was more to Jonah's reluctance to go preach to them.
 - a. What does Genesis 12:1-3 and Galatians 3:8 tell us about God's plan for Israel?
- b. What was the general attitude of the Jews towards the Gentiles? (Acts 10, pay special attention to verse 28.)
- 3. Read verses 4-17. There are 5 miracles in these verses. List them.
- 4. What do you learn about the crew of this ship as you read this passage?

5. What do you learn about Jonah?

Chapter 2 - Jonah's prayer and deliverance

- 6. According to verse 17 in chapter 1 Jonah was in the belly of the fish for 3 days before he finally prayed.
 - a. Can you relate to this in your own walk with God?
 - b. Why is it that God must break us before He can use us?

7. In Jonah's prayer, verses 1-3, what is he acknowledging about God?	
8. In verses 4-9 we see Jonah _	to God.

- 9. In verse 8 "worthless idols" is translated "lying vanities" in the King James Version. It's obvious that Jonah knew the Scriptures yet he believed worthless lies.
 - a. What were some of them?
 - b. Are there worthless lies you believe about God and are you ready to be rid of them?
- 10. What important lesson is found in verse 9?
- 11. Do you see another miracle in this chapter, if so what is it?
- 12. Is there a verse or passage that made an impression on you? Explain why and share it with us please.
